What?

- This year we are making a change to the 'Top of the Hill' badge system.
- Introducing a different colour badge for each year group.
- 4 to collect as you move through the school.

- Children have the potential to earn 4 badges instead of 1!



















HOME LEARNING



ENGLISH GRAMMAR (45 minute paper- up to 50 questions for 50 marks)

In the grammar test, children will be asked to complete questions testing the full range of grammar rules they have been taught over the last 4 years. Most questions involve ticking a box or underlining a word.



Similar types of grammar questions are used in English lessons, revision tests and as part of home learning tasks.

Spelling test (20 spellings for 20 marks)

Spelling 5: The word is crumb.

The bird found a crumb of bread.

The word is crumb.

Spelling 6: The word is probable.

It is **probable** that it will rain tomorrow.

The word is probable.

Spelling 7: The word is inspiring.

An inspiring author visited our school.

The word is inspiring.

This is an example of a teacher dictation

- The word the children have to spell
- That word in a sentence
- The word repeated for clarity

When teachers assess writing, there will be a strong emphasis on children being able to spell words from the year 3 & 4 spelling list and the year 5 & 6 spelling list



Reading Test (one hour up to 36 questions for 50 marks)



Pupils will have a total of 1 hour to read the 3 texts in a reading booklet and complete the questions at their own pace. There will be a mixture of genres of text. The least-demanding text will come first with the following texts increasing in level of difficulty.

The tests from the last 2 years have shown a heavy emphasis on understanding vocabulary. Wide and frequent reading is the best way to develop this skill.

Reading stamina is also an essential skill which can be developed through reading as often as possible. (A Recommended Reading list can be found in the SATs support area of the website)





Once the SATs tests are completed, they are sent away to be marked externally. Tests scores are sent out to schools early in July.

Children will be given a scaled score (converted from their test scores) which ranges from 80 up to 120. The national expected standard is a scaled score of 100 or above. If the scaled score is 110 or above, your child has achieved above the expected standard.

Here are the threholds to meet the age-related standard over some previous SATs tests.

Support learning of times tables facts

Completed test papers will be sent home

Real life opportunities to use maths - money, cooking, time, etc

Rehearse words from the spelling lists

Get involved with your child's home learning

Reading and discussing books

Practice and Information books



Access arrangements


We will inform you if your child meets the requirements for any access arrangements
















Kit List – A kit list has been sent out

PACKED LUNCH FOR DAY 1 – Friday 17th

For all of the activities, children need to be warm, safe and comfortable. A waterproof jacket is needed.
